

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
Dear Patrons, Friends and Supporters,

Welcome to the SCSO's Milestone 30th Season!

The repertoire featured at this evening's opening concert of the season juxtaposes two Baroque and one Classical masterpiece with powerful contemporary works of the 20th and 21st century. Tonight's performance highlights the beauty of the Baroque and Classical eras and the moving, inspiring and mystical energy found in some of today's classical music.



J.S. BACH (1685-1750) was a German composer, organist, and music teacher of the late Baroque

period. A member of a prodigious musical family, his vast body of work is renowned for its intricate counterpoint, harmonic and motivic organization, and mastery of a wide variety of musical forms. His fame as an virtuoso organist was considerable during his lifetime. Today, he is revered as being one of the greatest and most influential composers in the history of Western music.

Concerto No. in D minor after Vivaldi – BWV 596 This transcription by Bach is one of his famous arrangements of Antonio Vivaldi's music. Bach transcribed Vivaldi's Concerto for Two Violins and Cello, Op. 3, No. 11, RV 565, for the organ, creating BWV 596. He made these arrangements while working in Weimar around 1714 at the age of 29. Bach arranged almost half of Vivaldi's twelve concerti in a short period of time for different groups of instruments.

Largo e spiccato translates from Italian as "broad and separated".

Spiccato is a bowing technique for string instruments that produces a bouncing or separated effect, as opposed to a smooth, connected legato.

Fuga is the Italian word for "fugue," a contrapuntal composition technique where a short musical theme, or subject, is introduced and then repeated or imitated by different melodic lines (voices).

Whitbourn wrote a cycle of songs that he named *Luminosity*. The SCSO will weave the first movement of this cycle, *Lux in Tenebris* (Light Shines in Darkness)

into this evening's concert. This contemporary work is written for choir, viola, tam-tam (gong), dancers, and a long-necked plucked string instrument from India called a tanpura. The text centers on light's transcendent beauty and eternal love.

Composer Whitbourn believes... that the entire song cycle is conceived with a visual counterpoint to the music in mind, coming in the form of art, dance and light as well as in the use of space.



WOLFGANG AMADEUS MOZART (1756-1791) left an indelible legacy on Western

classical music despite his short life. A child prodigy who composed over 600 works in a mere 35 years, Mozart perfected and elevated existing musical forms like the symphony, concerto, and opera, imbuing them with emotional depth, lyrical melodies, and structural elegance. He was a key figure in transitioning music from the Baroque to the Classical era. Today, his music is a cornerstone of the classical repertoire, performed

worldwide and widely recognized even in popular culture for its universal appeal.

Regina Coeli (Queen of Heaven)
K. 108 is a youthful yet masterful setting of the Marian antiphon, composed in Salzburg in May 1771 when he was just 15 years old. Mozart adopted the vibrant, operatic style of contemporary Neapolitan church music, departing from the more conservative sacred music of Salzburg. The original work is scored for solo soprano, four-part chorus (SATB), and orchestra.

The four-movement structure balances rousing, homophonic choral sections with florid solo arias, highlighting the work's "concertante" nature. The joyful first and fourth movements showcase the full ensemble in a bright, celebratory C major. The inner movements feature a solo soprano in dramatic, coloratura-filled passages that sound almost

like an operatic scene. The seamless interplay between soloist and choir, the rich orchestral colors, and the integration of secular musical styles mark this work as a dynamic blend of church and operatic traditions.

JAMES WHITBOURN's Requiem Canticorum (Requiem of Song), composed in 2010, is a five-movement commemorative work setting texts associated with the Requiem Mass. Its title, meaning "a Requiem of song" or "canticles," reflects its purpose as a piece to honor the dead and console the bereaved through a cycle of prayers. The work creates a meditative and often ethereal soundscape.

The work draws inspiration from various sources, including earlier orchestral works by Whitbourn and the serene plainsong melody used famously by Maurice Duruflé in his Requiem. The solo soprano saxophone adds a lyrical, improvisatory, and deeply expressive voice to the choral and organ textures.



ANTONIO VIVALDI (1678-1741) was an Italian composer, virtuoso violinist, and

Roman Catholic priest from Venice who was a leading figure of the Baroque period. For most of his life, he was based at the Ospedale della Pietà, a Venetian institution for abandoned children, where he taught violin, composed, and directed the music of its all-female orchestra. While his operas and

sacred works were successful during his lifetime, his fame faded, and he died in poverty in Vienna in 1741.

Vivaldi's musical legacy is primarily defined by his instrumental concertos, which standardized the three-movement (fast-slow-fast) structure that became a model for the rest of Europe. His brilliant violin technique and inventive use of instrumentation influenced composers like Johann Sebastian Bach, who transcribed many of Vivaldi's works. Though his music was largely forgotten after his

death, a 20th-century revival of interest brought his work back to prominence.

Gloria in D (1715) was written by Vivaldi for the choir of the Ospedale della Pietà orphanage for girls. This famous choral work presents the traditional Gloria from the Latin Mass in twelve varied cantata-like sections that explore a range of moods and textures

- "Gloria in excelsis Deo"
 (Chorus): A celebratory and joyful opening, propelled by a vibrant trumpet and oboe obbligato and marked by leaping octave figures.
- "Et in terra pax" (Chorus): This meditative and slower movement shifts to the minor key, with subtle chromaticism and expressive counterpoint.
- "Laudamus te" (Two Sopranos):
 A lively and virtuosic duet for two sopranos, structured like a miniature concerto with alternating instrumental and vocal passages.
- 4. "Gratias agimus tibi" (Chorus): A short, hymn-like, and homophonic movement expressing gratitude in a broad and solemn manner.
- 5. "Propter magnam gloriam"
 (Chorus): A fugal and energetic allegro that flows seamlessly from the previous movement, conveying God's greatness through tightly woven counterpoint.

- 6. "Domine Deus" (Soprano Solo): A lyrical and serene sicilianostyle aria for soprano and oboe, creating a lilting, pastoral texture.
- 7. "Domine, Fili unigenite"
 (Chorus): A movement
 characterized by French-style
 dotted rhythms and a majestic
 feel, featuring the choir in a regal
 and unified texture.
- "Domine Deus, Agnus Dei"
 (Alto and Chorus): This impassioned movement features a solo alto pleading for mercy, alternating with dramatic choral interjections.
- "Qui tollis peccata mundi"
 (Chorus): A somber and expressive choral movement in the minor key, asking Christ to "take away the sins of the world".
- 10. "Qui sedes ad dexteram Patris"
 (Alto Solo): A poignant alto solo
 with concerto-like features,
 beseeching mercy from Christ
 seated at the right hand of the
 Father.
- 11. "Quoniam tu solus sanctus"
 (Chorus): A concentrated and powerful reprise of the opening movement's celebratory music, paving the way for the grand finale.
- **12. "Cum Sancto Spiritu"** (Chorus): The work concludes with a triumphant and elaborate double fugue.

Dr. Ryan Enright Organist


Dr. Ryan Enright, recognized for his organ playing and improvising, has performed recitals in Canada and the U.S.A. in organ

repertoire ranging from around 1530 to the present day. Improvisation plays a crucial role in his activities, from reharmonizing a hymn to improvising on the spot after being given a theme or two.

A native of Montreal, Quebec, Enright studied the organ privately with Marc-André Doran and, while enrolled at the Conservatoire de Musique et d'Art Dramatique, with Gaston Arel and Jean LeBuis. Enright received the bachelor's and master's degrees—and Artist Diploma—in organ performance from McGill University. Enright received the DMA in Organ Performance & Literature from the Eastman School of Music (2012), where he studied with William Porter and played harpsichord and organ continuo for Eastman's Collegium Musicum. He has studied improvisation most closely with William Porter and Julian Wachner, also taking workshops with renowned improvisation teachers.

Enright has competed internationally, receiving first prizes at the Canadian Music Competition (1997), Quebec Organ Competition (2004), and National Organ Playing Competition of the Royal Canadian College of Organists (2007). He was a finalist in the CIOC (Canadian International Organ Competition), 2011.

Enright relocated to Sacramento in October of 2011 to become Organist of St. John's Lutheran Church and Accompanist for the Sacramento Choral Society and Orchestra, Sacramento State's choirs, and Schola Cantorum of Sacred Heart Church. In August of 2016 Enright recorded an album entitled "St. John's Resounds" with harpist Dr. Beverly Wesner-Hoehn. Recorded at St. John's on the splendid Bedient organ, the album consists of Laurin's "Fantasy for Organ and Harp" plus solo organ and harp works. In California, Enright has

performed in Chico, Yuba City, the San Francisco Bay Area, as well as in the states of Washington and New York. Enright accompanied the SCSO on their tours of Italy (2012), Northern France, Paris, and England (2015), Austria, Slovenia, and Croatia (2019), and most recently to Northern Italy (June 2024).

Since Fall 2018 Enright is Staff Accompanist II at Sacramento State University, where he accompanies two classical choirs, half of the students of two voice studios, and the Opera Theatre Workshop. From 2021-2023 he was Co-Dean of the American Guild of Organists, Sacramento Valley Chapter. He teaches organ privately. Enright's passions away from the organ loft include Argentine Tango, hiking, camping, and whitewater kayaking.



Sarah Sy, Soprano

Sarah Joy Polante Sy is a Northern California-based soprano known for her fluid phrasing and vivid expressions while

on stage. She is also an international sound designer for commercial audio and video production. When not performing in concerts, she can also be found in theatrical productions around the region.

She finished her Master of Music in Performance from California State University, Sacramento in 2022. She completed her two concurrent undergraduate degrees in 2019: a Bachelor of Music in Vocal Performance at California State University, Sacramento, and a Bachelor in Fine Arts: Music Production and Sound Design at Academy of Art University, San Francisco.

She performs with Schola Cantorum directed by Dr. Donald Kendrick and has been an audio engineer and international recording artist with performances in Manila, Vancouver, Norway, and London. Her recent productions include being the soprano soloist in Sacramento

Choral Society and Orchestra's 2024 tour of Mozart's Requiem in Italy, Aline in Gilbert and Sullivan's The Sorcerer, and SCSO's productions of Carmina Burana and Verdi's Requiem. She has also performed with Camerata Capistrano, Sacramento City Theatre, Splinter Group Theatre, and Light Opera Theatre Sacramento.

Her prominent experience in performing involves twelve years of performing with Sinag-tala Theatre and Performing Arts Association, a touring non-profit Filipino cultural ensemble wherein she was appointed choral director for five seasons. She has been an award recipient for the SFBAC NATS Singing Festival, Mu Phi Epsilon competitions, and the Sacramento Saturday Club Scholarship. She has been active in the Sacramento Alumni Chapter since 2022. When not performing, she is frequently behind the soundboard or technical portion of productions in the Northern California region.

Sarah thanks her family and friends for their support, and she is honored to be a soloist for the SCSO's Stained Glass concert.



Rachael Davis, Soprano

Rachael Davis, soprano and Sacramento native, is an expressive interpreter of operatic and classical repertoire. She

earned her Bachelor of Arts in Music from California State University, Sacramento, and continues her vocal studies with soprano Carrie Hennessey. Ms. Davis has performed as the soprano soloist in *Eternal Source of Light Divine* with Apollo Arts and was a first-place winner in both the Classical and Contemporary/Musical Theatre categories of the NATS (National Association of Teachers of Singing) San Francisco Bay Area Chapter Auditions. She was also a semi-finalist in the 2023 Classical Singer Vocal Competition and has worked in a master class with renowned soprano Deborah Voigt. Beyond the classical stage, Ms.

Davis performs with a jazz, pop, and classic rock band, and is active in Musical Theatre and worship music. She was a member for many years in Schola Cantorum at Sacred Heart Church in Sacramento, directed by Donald Kendrick. Ms Davis recently appeared as a soloist for the SCSO's August 2025 *Summer Sing* at John's Lutheran Church in Sacramento.



Chris Mackey, Baritone

A native of Stockton, **Chris Mackey** is honored to be invited to join the Sacramento Choral Society and Orchestra for this year's

Stained Glass concert. Currently a member of the Sacred Heart Church's Schola Cantorum in Sacramento, Chris has a deep passion for baroque music and chamber ensemble singing.

This past spring, Chris appeared as the Baritone soloist in Schola Cantorum's performance of the Duruflé *Requiem*, and most recently had the privilege of serving as the Baritone soloist in SCSO's Summer Sing performance of the Fauré *Requiem*.

Before relocating to Sacramento in 2020, Chris performed with various vocal ensembles such as the Seraphim Vocal Ensemble in Los Angeles, directed by Tiffany Warren, and the San Francisco Choral Artists, led by Magen Solomon.

From 2007 to 2012, Chris studied vocal performance at the University of the Pacific with Burr Phillips and at San Joaquin Delta College with Seija Anderson. His operatic credits during his time at UOP include roles as Papageno in *The Magic Flute* and Mack the Knife in *The Threepenny Opera* with Pacific Opera Theater, as well as chorus appearances with Stockton Opera in productions of *La Bohème*, *Gianni Schicchi*, and *Pagliacci*.



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Dr. Donald Kendrick

A native of Calgary, Alberta, Canada, Donald Kendrick first arrived in Sacramento in 1985 to become the Director of Choral

Activities at California State University, Sacramento (CSUS). For the past 40 years, he has worked diligently to create awareness of the power and importance of the choral and choral-orchestral art via three important pillars in our society: Community, State, and Church. His impact as an educator and conductor has greatly enhanced the quality of life in our region and has resonated on national and international levels.

In 1996, Don became the founding conductor of the Sacramento Choral Society & Orchestra (SCSO), the only chorus among the 12,000 community choruses in the United States to have a collective bargaining agreement with a professional orchestra. The SCSO regularly presents choral orchestral concerts in Sacramento at the SAFE Credit Union Performing Arts Center, Memorial Auditorium and Fremont Presbyterian Church. Under Don's leadership, SCSO also undertakes extensive education and outreach to Veterans and countless nonprofits serving the underprivileged.

Under Don's direction, the SCSO has produced eleven professionally-mastered CDs and has a unique KVIE PBS documentary that is shown throughout the United States. (Available on YouTube) He has received numerous awards including a "Legend of the Arts" award from the Sacramento Metropolitan Arts Commission for his dedication to our Community.

In May 1995, Don made his Carnegie Hall conducting debut in a performance of Verdi's Requiem. In May 2003, he returned to Carnegie Hall with the SCSO to conduct a triumphant performance of Orff's Carmina Burana. Don and the SCSO have represented Sacramento as great international choral ambassadors around the world with performances in Munich, Prague, Vienna and Budapest (2004), in Venice, Lucca and at the Vatican in Rome (2013), in Notre Dame in Paris, the American Cemetery, L'Abbaye St. Martin de Mondaye (Normandy), and St. Paul's Cathedral in London (2015), and in Latvia, Estonia and Finland (2017). Don also led a contingent of 220 Sacramento singers and guests to China with performances in Beijing, Tianjin, Xian, Jinan (Sacramento's Sister City) and a special performance on the Great Wall. In 2008 he made his debut with the SCSO in LA's Disney Hall in a well-received performance of the Mozart Requiem. In 2009 Don led the SCSO on a tour of Western Canada with performances in Victoria and Vancouver, British Columbia.

In 1993, Don co-founded the Sacramento Children's Chorus (SCC) with his former graduate student Lynn Stevens. The SCC regularly partners with the SCSO in their performances.

Don is also Organist and Director of Music at Sacramento's Sacred Heart Church where he conducts Vox Nova and Schola Cantorum. The latter ensemble has recorded eight professionally mastered CDs and has toured throughout North America, Spain, England, Italy, Austria and Germany.

During his tenure at Sacramento State, Don oversaw the growth of three choirs, taught advanced conducting, led his students on international tours to Europe, China and Canada, and produced countless memorable performances. He also established the Graduate program in Choral Conducting. Don took great pleasure in linking Sacramento State to the community, and he was awarded one of the University's first Community Outreach Awards in 2004. He was named Outstanding Teacher of the Year by the Capitol Section of the California Music Educators Association (CMEA). He organized high school festivals such as "Real Men Sing" and the "Women's High School Festival," and has served as the Choral Representative of the CMEA–Capitol Section, providing young singers with the opportunity to experience excellence in choral music together.

Don studied at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago, the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston, and he holds a doctoral degree from the Eastman School of Music where he also served on the faculty. In addition to Sac State, he has taught at Louisiana State University, the University of the Pacific Conservatory of Music in Stockton and at the University of Regina in Saskatchewan.

As Don embraces his semi-retirement years, we are pleased that he is continuing to guide and nurture the Sacramento Choral Society & Orchestra.
